





ATTENDANCE FACTS Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.

> <u>Chronically absent</u> is defined as missing 10% or more of the school year.

> > 10% = 18 or more school days. CMS Policy is you can not miss more then 10 days, or you can be potentially retained.

> > > 18 days = $3\frac{1}{2}$ weeks of school

Your children can suffer academically if they miss 10% of school days or about 18 days. That can be just <u>one day every two weeks</u>, and that can happen before you know it.

CMS ATTENDANCE POLICY

What does the Law Say?

- The North Carolina compulsory attendance statute requires that every child in the state between the ages of seven (or younger, if enrolled) and 16 attend school every day school is in session. Regular attendance by every student is mandatory. Parents, custodians and legal guardians are responsible for ensuring that students attend and remain at school daily. Principals will ensure that parents and students are notified of the school's attendance plan at the opening of school.
- A student must be in attendance for at least one-half of the instructional day in order to be counted present for the day.
- It is the responsibility of parents to notify the school when their child is absent from school and to inform the principal or other designated staff person of the reason for the absence.
- For a late arrival or early dismissal, parents must provide an explanation to the school according to the procedures established by the principal and included in the school attendance plan. 2. These explanations shall be maintained by the school according to the procedures established by the principal.

Attendance Steps at Merry Oaks

- 1. You will receive a message from the classroom teacher, social worker, or attendance secretary about your child's absences
 - a. You will also receive a letter from the school for every 3, 6, or 10 days that your child has missed
- 2. Meeting with social worker and attendance secretary to sign an attendance contract
- 3. Meeting with social worker to complete an attendance review conference (ARC)

Merry Oaks Uniform Policy Política de uniformes de Merry Oaks

All Scholars are required to wear the school uniform every day. The school uniform consists of:

- Bottoms: Dark blue (NOT BLACK) or khaki bottoms (pants, shorts, skirts, jumpers, skorts, etc.) <u>No blue jeans</u>
- **Tops**: White or Navy Blue tops (long or short sleeved shirts, blouses, turtlenecks, etc.) All tops must have a collar or must be a dress shirt. (No T-shirts)
- **Dresses:** Dark blue or khaki.
- Socks: Dark blue or white socks
- **Shoes:** Tennis shoes or any type of casual or dress shoes. No flip-flops, for safety reasons.
- Belts: A dark-colored belt
- Hats: No hats, caps, hoods, or scarves inside the school building unless for religious purposes

Todos los becarios deben llevar el uniforme escolar todos los días. El uniforme escolar consiste en:

- **Pantalones**: Pantalones de color azul oscuro o caqui (pantalones, shorts, faldas, jerseys, faldas pantalón, etc.) No pantalones vaqueros.
- **Tops:** Blusas blancas o azul marino (camisas de manga larga o corta, blusas, jerseys de cuello alto, etc.) Todas las blusas deben tener cuello o ser camisas de vestir (no camisetas).
- Vestidos: Azul oscuro o caqui.
- **Calcetines:** Calcetines azules oscuros o blancos
- **Zapatos:** Tenis o cualquier otro tipo de calzado informal o de vestir. No se permiten huaraches, por razones de seguridad.
- Cinturones: Un cinturón de color oscuro
- Sombreros: No se permiten sombreros, gorras, capuchas o bufandas dentro del edificio escolar, a menos que sea por motivos religiosos.

Uniform Policy 1

First Offense- Verbal Warning with teacher (sticker placed on student) - Student name tracked on tracker
Second Offense- Written Warning- Letter home signed by Principal and sticker
Third Offense- Letter signed by Principal with student incentive taken away (ie- Field Trip, class party)
Fourth Offense- Students must be picked up or clothes brought to the school to change with the admin conference and parents sign a uniform contract.

Student Incentives: -Uniform Paws- different Color -Class jar incentive for uniforms for classrooms (spin wheel) -Class/teacher name included on main hallway A wall-

class shout outs- PreK, K-2 and 3-5



Why are we here?

The *Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA),* as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) of 2015, requires that each Title I School hold an Annual Meeting for parents/families/community members for the purpose of:

What is a Title I school?

Title I is the largest federally funded educational program. A Title I school is a school receiving federal funds for students. The basic principle of Title I is that schools with large concentrations of low-income students receive supplemental funds to meet students' educational goals.

What does it mean to be a Title I School?

- Being a Title I school means receiving federal funding (Title I dollars) to supplement the school's existing programs. These dollars are used for the following:
 - Identifying students experiencing academic difficulties and providing timely assistance to help students meet the state's challenging content standards.
 - Purchasing supplemental staff/programs/materials/supplies
 - Conducting parent and family engagement meetings/trainings/activities
 - Recruiting/Hiring/Retaining Highly-Qualified Teachers
- Being a Title I school also means encouraging ongoing parent and family engagement and advocating for parents' rights

How are Title I funds used in our school?

- Parent Involvement Events
- Professional Development for staff
- Substitutes for staff professional development
- Tutoring services (HEART)
- Supplies and materials (books, technology)
- Family Advocate
- BMT (Behavior Modification Technician)
- Title 1 Tutors (2)
- Field Trips

What is the 1% set-aside and how are parents involved?

- Any Local Education Agency (LEA) or school district with a Title I Allocation exceeding \$500,000 is required by law to set aside 1% of the Title I allocation for parent and family engagement.
- Of that 1%, 10% may be reserved at the LEA/district level for system-wide initiatives related to parent and family engagement. The remaining 90% must be allocated to all Title I schools in the district. In CMS, each Title I school receives its portion of the 90% to implement school-level parent and family engagement activities and events
- Title I parents have the right to provide input into decisions regarding how this money is spent. This process is completed through the School Improvement Team (SIT)

What is included in the School's Parent and Family Engagement Policy?

How can I volunteer to assist my student with school needs?

How do I request the qualifications of my child's teachers?

- Title I parents and families have the right to request the qualifications of their child's teachers
- How are you notified of this right and what is the process for making a request?
 - You can request it from Jasmine Holt (Title 1 Lead)
 - Request should be completed within 30 days.

How will I be notified if my child is taught by a teacher who is not Highly-Qualified?

- Being Highly Qualified in NC means you have successfully passed the licensure exams required or received alternate licensure in a way set out by NC law.
- Parents and families are notified if teachers do not meet ESSA's requirements for Highly-Qualified
- Parents may request information on teacher qualifications in writing

Complaint Procedures

Contact the front office, inform the front office secretary they will complete a parent concern form, or you can come in to complete the form and a member of the admin team will address your concern within 24 hours.
