Whitewater Way Classroom Management

- School wide
- All students begins the day on GREEN
- Positive behavior will be rewarded by moving up
- Inappropriate behavior will result in moving down
- <u>Phone calls</u> will be made when a student is on RED
- All students will have the opportunity to earn their way back up ONE level from yellow and orange
- Students CAN NOT move up from red
- Behavior WILL be communicated daily to families using student agendas
- Students rewards and incentives will be given based on classroom expectations

Purple - Super Student Blue - Great Choices Green - Ready to Learn Yellow - Think About It Orange - Warning Red - Teacher Choice



Daily Expectations

- Student Arrival: 7:15-7:45
 - Students CANNOT be dropped of prior to 7:15, and all parents must follow car rider procedures
- Student Dismissal: 2:45
 - Early dismissal ends at 2:00 p.m. daily. After 2:00 p.m., students will not be dismissed. If you have an appointment for your child in the early or mid-afternoon, make sure you pick them up prior to the 2:00 p.m. cutoff.
 - Transportation changes MUST be called into the office (not just messaged to the child's teacher). It is the parent's responsibility to call in the change.



Breakfast & Lunch

- All Whitewater Academy students will receive free breakfast and lunch.
- Any birthday treats will be passed out during lunch. All treats must be store bought and individually wrapped (ex. Little Debbies, Juice Box)
- Students who do not bring a lunch box, MUST get a lunch from the cafeteria.



Transportation

- Need transportation for morning and/or afternoon?
 - If you are new to CMS or do not currently have a bus, please complete the CMS Ridership form that can be found on the CMS website under "buses". If this form is completed after August 8th, please plan for your child to be a car rider until you receive communication from Whitewater Academy that they have been assigned a bus.
- Students are assigned a bus based on their <u>permanent address in</u> <u>Powerschool</u>.



Uniforms

- Whitewater Academy is no longer a uniform school. Our Dress Code policy was provided in the Beginning of Year Welcome Mailings and can be accessed on our website.
- Student attire MUST be appropriate and follow the school Dress Code policy. Parents will be contacted and asked to bring appropriate clothes for students not following the Dress Code policy.

Why are we here?

The Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) of 2015, requires that each Title I School hold an Annual Meeting for parents/families/community members for the purpose of:

What is a Title I school?

Title I is the largest federally funded educational program. A Title I school is a school receiving federal funds for students. The basic principle of Title I is that schools with large concentrations of low-income students receive supplemental funds to meet students' educational goals.

What does it mean to be a Title I School?

- Being a Title I school means receiving federal funding (Title I dollars) to <u>supplement</u> the school's existing programs. These dollars are used for the following:
 - Identifying students experiencing academic difficulties and providing timely assistance to help students meet the state's challenging content standards.
 - Purchasing supplemental staff/programs/materials/supplies
 - Conducting parent and family engagement meetings/trainings/activities
 - Recruiting/Hiring/Retaining Highly-Qualified Teachers
- Being a Title I school also means encouraging ongoing parent and family engagement and advocating for parents' rights

How are Title I funds used in our school?

- Additional staffing
- Parent Involvement
- Professional Development for Staff
- Technology students are 1-1
- Instructional supplies and materials
- Social Emotional Support
- Classroom library books

What is the 1% set-aside and how are parents involved?

- Any Local Education Agency (LEA) or school district with a Title I Allocation exceeding \$500,000 is required by law to set aside 1% of the Title I allocation for parent and family engagement.
- Of that 1%, 10% may be reserved at the LEA/district level for system-wide initiatives related to parent and family engagement. The remaining 90% must be allocated to all Title I schools in the district. In CMS, each Title I school receives its portion of the 90% to implement school-level parent and family engagement activities and events
- Title I parents have the right to provide input into decisions regarding how this money is spent. This process is completed through the School Improvement Team (SIT)

Parent and Family Engagement Allocation

- Allocation: \$5,860
- Reason: Effective daily and weekly communication is the goal for students and families. Supplies and Materials funds are used to purchase communication materials like folders and agendas to ensure all families can engage in their child's learning consistently.

What is the CMS Parent and Family Engagement Policy?

- Parents of students at Title I schools have the right to be engaged in the development of this plan and have access to the plan using the information below

What is included in the School's Parent and Family Engagement Policy?

How do I request the qualifications of my child's teachers?

- Title I parents and families have the right to request the qualifications of their child's teachers
- How are you notified of this right and what is the process for making a request?

 - Request should be completed within 30 days

How will I be notified if my child is taught by a teacher who is not Highly-Qualified?

- Being Highly Qualified in NC means you have successfully passed the licensure exams required or received alternate licensure in a way set out by NC law.
- Parents and families are notified if teachers do not meet ESSA's requirements for Highly-Qualified
- Parents may request information on teacher qualifications in writing

Complaint Procedures

If you have any questions or concerns regarding your child's education, please reach out to the classroom teacher first. If the problem can not be resolved between the parent and the teacher, the principal should be contacted
