Bus Behavior

Students are expected to follow bus rules at all times. Violations of bus rules will result in applicable consequences, including bus suspensions and/or out of school suspensions. Bus referrals and/or suspensions may impact a student's ability to access CMS transportation for school-sponsored field trips/athletic events.

Student safety is the primary concern of our school system. Misbehavior on school buses poses a threat to the safety of everyone on the roadway. Laws and regulations have been established to ensure the safety of students and drivers on district owned/operated, contracted, or authorized vehicles.

Expected Behavior on the School Bus or at the Bus Stop:

	Refrain from conduct or behavior that interferes with the orderly, safe and expeditious transportation of bus
	riders.
	Obey the bus driver at all times.
	Act appropriately while waiting for the bus.
	Give your proper name when requested by the bus driver or monitor.
	Be at the bus stop at least ten minutes prior to a scheduled stop time.
	Ride only on the assigned bus.
	Board and depart only at the assigned bus stop.
	Remain seated at all times when the bus is moving.
	Refrain from eating or drinking while aboard the bus.
П	Refrain from using cellular telephones and other electronic devices while on the bus

Violations of these standards, the Code of Student Conduct, or any behavior which substantially distracts the bus driver and causes, or has the potential to cause, a safety hazard on a moving bus, may be the basis for suspension from the bus and/or school or revocation of bus-riding privileges.

Cell Phones

Students may not use cell phones during school hours or allow other students to use their cell phones. Students with cell phones must store them in their backpack and the cell phone must be turned off. Cell phones may be taken by Winterfield staff if used in violation of this policy and kept in the office until picked up by a parent. Students are prohibited from texting on their watches as well.

Toys, Electronics, and Items from Home

Students are not allowed to bring computer games, Game Boys, toys, virtual pets, trading cards, etc. to school. Our goal is to keep students focused on learning. Please note that WES faculty is not liable or responsible for any lost or stolen cell phones, electronics, or other non-academic related items; thus we ask children to leave them at home.

Bear Scholar Attire (Uniforms)

Uniforms are required for all scholars enrolled at Winterfield Elementary School. School uniforms help us create the safest possible environment for our scholars. All scholars are required to wear the school uniform every day.

The school uniform consists of:

- Bottoms: Dark blue or khaki bottoms (pants, shorts, skirts, jumpers, skorts, etc.). Shorts and skirts should fall slightly above the knee line. Scholars should not wear blue jeans of any kind. *We host one uniform free day per month (see calendar below).
- Tops: White, Blue (Light, Dark, Royal), Gray, or Yellow tops (long or short sleeved shirts, blouses, turtlenecks, etc.) All tops must have a collar or must be a dress shirt. (No T-shirts.) Shirts/blouses must be tucked into pants at all times. Winterfield Spirit T-Shirts and/or college T-shirts can be part of the uniform daily.
- Dresses: Dark blue or khaki. Dresses should fall slightly above the knee line.
- Socks: Scholars should wear dark blue or white socks with their uniforms.
- Shoes: Scholars will be expected to wear shoes that have a closed toe and heel. Scholars can wear tennis shoes or any type of other casual or dress shoes. Open-toe and open-heel shoes such as sandals and flip-flops are not permitted for safety reasons.
- Belts: Scholars will be expected to wear a dark-colored belt with their uniforms. Shirts/blouses must be tucked into pants at all times.
- Hats: Scholars will not be allowed to wear hats, caps, hoods, or scarves inside school buildings.

Please note the following guidelines:

- Scholars are to be in uniform every day, except on scheduled non-uniform days (see below) or when special permission is granted by administration for Spirit Days.
- Parents will receive advance notice of Spirit Days. On those days your child can wear the theme of the day or their WES uniform. Spirit Days are not non-uniform days.
- Scholars may be excluded from incentives and rewards if they are not wearing the required uniform on the day of the incentive or reward.

WES Anti-Bullying Policy

At Charlotte Mecklenburg Schools and Winterfield Elementary School, we take bullying seriously and students will receive strong consequences if they are involved in this behavior.

Key Points:

- Childhood bullying is a significant problem nationwide. It contributes to absenteeism, mental and physical stress, poor school performance, poor self-esteem, and, in some cases, school violence.
- Statistics show that 160,000 children in the United States miss school each day as a result of being bullied.
- Bullying happens when someone continues hurting, frightening, threatening or leaving someone out on purpose.

Bullying behaviors include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Hurting someone physically by hitting, kicking, tripping or pushing.
- Using technology to spread rumors or say hurtful things about others.
- Stealing or damaging another person's things.
- Ganging up on someone.
- Teasing someone in a hurtful way.
- Spreading rumors or untruths about someone.
- Using put-downs, i.e., insulting someone's race, making fun of someone for being a boy or girl, etc.
- Leaving someone out on purpose or trying to get other students not to play with someone.
- Touching or showing private body parts and other forms of <u>sexual harassment</u>.

Students at WES will do the following to prevent bullying:

Treat each other respectfully	Refuse to watch, laugh or join in when someone is being bullied. Try to include everyone in play, especially those who are left out.

In addition, as with other disciplinary violations, any manner of bullying that occurs off campus may violate the Student Code of Conduct if it has a direct and immediate impact to the orderly and efficient operation of the school or the safety of individuals in the school environment.

- If you're comfortable, tell the bully to stop
- Walk away
- Always notify an adult at school immediately: teacher, counselor, administrator, etc.

Attendance

Bear Scholars Have Good Attendance

Arriving to school on time every day is the first step to ensure that you will be successful in school. Students who consistently come to school do better academically than those who miss a lot of days. Furthermore, punctuality is an important life skill that requires discipline and organization: two skills that are essential in college. It is much easier to develop good habits around punctuality when you are young, than to reverse bad habits when you are already in college or the workforce.

The school day for students begins at 8am and ends at 3pm. The doors open at 7:30 a.m. If a student arrives after 8am, the responsible adult must come to the office and sign in the student. Breakfast is not served after 8am. All students are expected to attend school regularly. If a student is absent from school, a note explaining the absence must be sent with the student when s/he returns. The excuse must be from the parent, guardian, or doctor. Excused absences shall be given in case of illness, death in the family, or special religious holidays. Unexcused absences are given for any other reason. In all cases, excessive absences will be turned over to the School Social Worker.

Morning Carpool: Please drive all the way around the entry circle to allow as many cars as possible to unload, even if the entry circle is clear. Students should have all materials ready prior to stopping in order to enter the building as early as possible. If you arrive at 8am, please walk your child in to get a tardy slip.

Early Dismissal: We have 420 minutes per day to provide a high quality instruction to your child(ren). Every minute counts. We have noticed that many parents are checking their students out of school for early dismissal on a regular basis. Please note repeated early dismissal decreases student learning time. We need them here. Students must be picked up by 3:15pm. for early dismissal, no exceptions. Identification must be shown to pick up a student. We will not make changes to student dismissal after 2pm.

Transportation Changes: Winterfield is always dedicated to the security and safety of all students. Therefore, phone calls will not be accepted for a transportation change. Parents must send a note to their child's teacher stating details of the transportation change. Students will not be permitted to change afternoon transportation without a note from a parent/guardian. Note: Students can only ride their assigned bus home from school. District policy prevents students from riding home a different bus. Transportation change notes must include the following information:

- Student name
- Date
- Transportation change (car rider or walker only)
- Parent signature

Afternoon Car Riders: Carpool begins at 2:55 p.m. and ends at 3:15 p.m. Please support our staff by making every effort to be on time. All students must be picked up by 3:15 p.m. every day.

Cheating/Plagiarism

Cheating is a serious offense. If a student copies another student's work or if a student gives another student his/her work, it is considered cheating. Plagiarism involves the stealing of someone else's ideas or words as one's own or the imitation of the language, ideas and thoughts of another author (or person) and then passing them off as the student's own original work. Cheating and plagiarism will result in a serious consequence.

Chromebooks

Winterfield Elementary School is a 1:1 technology school. iPads (K-2) and chromebooks (3-5) will only be issued to students if the User Agreement Form is signed by the student and parent/guardian. Technology will be used during each class to enhance instruction and learning. Technology must be used for instructional purposes only, and students are financially responsible for the iPad or chromebook issued to them. Students are expected to follow school expectations for technology use.

Study Tips	Tips for Success in School
Read the information in chunks.	Students need between 10 and 12 hours of sleep. This means going to bed between 8:00 and 8:30 every night.

- 2. Look back at what you have read to review vocabulary and definitions.
- 3. Review notes that you have taken.
- 4. Say the information out loud.
- 5. Write the main facts or vocabulary and definitions. (Make note cards)
- 6. Have someone quiz you after studying the information.
- 7. Study a little each night rather than trying to remember it all the night before a test.
- 8. Practice by writing all of the steps to solving problems.

- 2. Be prepared every day by doing your homework right after school.
- 3. Charge your device EVERY night.
- 4. Save time by getting your backpack, homework, and uniform or clothes ready for the next day before you go to bed each night.
- Ask a responsible friend for their phone number in case you have questions about homework or school events.
- 6. Read before bed each night. Using technology will keep you awake.




